Wisconsin author and illustrator Lois Ehlert had a long history with the Cooperative Children's Book Center and the Friends of the CCBC. As an artist, Ms. Ehlert shared her creative expertise with the CCBC in numerous ways, including design of the CCBC logo, selection of furniture



(including the Eames chairs in the Reading Room), and creation of CCBC fabric pieces. Colorful flowers from her 1988 perennial classic Planting a Rainbow were transformed into window decals in celebration of the CCBC's relocation to the 4th floor of the Teacher Education Building in 2014, and added to the hallway entry in 2022.

When the CCBC received the print publication, the staff knew instantly that Ms. Washington's art and message should be featured at the entrance to the CCBC. They were grateful to acquire a giclée of the not-for-sale original art.

Charlotte Zolotow was a prolific editor of children's books. In addition, Ms. Zolotow wrote more than 65 picture books, including Mr. Rabbit and the Lovely Present (1962) illustrated by Maurice Sendak. She attended the University of Wisconsin in Madison from 1933 to 1936, where she studied writing with Professor Helen C. White in the English Department. When asked recently about her experience as a student on this campus, Ms. Zolotow

remarked that at the University of Wisconsin she was taught how to think, not what to think. In 1998, the annual Charlotte Zolotow Lecture and Award for outstanding writing in a picture book was established by the Cooperative Children's Book Center to honor Ms. Zolotow's talent in writing for young children and her lifelong commitment to excellence in literature for children and young adults

4. What Can You Do with a Paleta?

"Where the big velvet roses bloom / red and pink and fuschia, / where the accordion plays sassy and sweet... THAT's my barrio." A young Latina girl goes on to describe the tinkly arrival of the paleta wagon in her neighborhood. The ice-cold popsicle comes in a rainbow of colors and flavors that makes for tough decisions ("Strawberry? Or coconut?") and many opportunities. With a paleta you "paint your tongue purple and green" or cool off on a hot

day. A paleta can be an offering of friendship or a teasing way to win a baseball game. Carmen Tafolla's delectable story appeals to the senses with its rich imagery and crisp language. Sun-warmed, richly colored illustrations by Magaly Morales further bring the little girl's vibrant Latino community to life. Winner of the 2010 Charlotte Zolotow Award, given annually to the author of the best picture book text published in the United States in the preceding year by the Cooperative Children's Book Center.

Wisconsin author and illustrator Lois Ehlert had a long history with the Cooperative Children's Book Center and the Friends of the CCBC. As an artist, Ms. Ehlert shared her creative expertise with the CCBC in numerous ways, including design of the CCBC logo, selection of furniture (including the Eames chairs in the Reading Room), and creation of CCBC fabric pieces. This fabric sleeve once covered the concrete pillar outside the entrance to the CCBC in its prior location on the 4th floor of Helen C. White Hall. The red color and large letters made the CCBC visible from the far end of the hallway, beckoning visitors as part of the CCBC's 20th anniversary events.

Wisconsin author and illustrator Kevin Henkes launched his career while an undergraduate at the University of Wisconsin–Madison. His deep appreciation for children's literature and artwork was fostered by his connection to the Cooperative Children's Book

Center, where he worked as a student under director Ginny Moore Kruse. Mr. Henkes, along with his wife, artist and illustrator Laura Dronzek, was also influenced by Gertrude B. Herman, a professor in the Library School who taught children's literature. "She knew so much about not just children's literature but art, philosophy, and history. She was one of the smartest people I've ever met, and she was so kind and generous to both of us. We became lifelong friends."

Children's book author and illustrator Barbara Cooney won the 1959 Caldecott Medal for Chanticleer and the Fox. Mildred L. Batchelder was the Head of the Children's Services Division of the American Library Association and an advocate for multicultural and global literature. The Batchelder Award for translated books would be established in her name in 1968.

Book Trails was a popular program on the Wisconsin School of the Air (WSA). For nearly fifty years, the WSA broadcast a curriculum of music, art, science, literature, current events, social studies, government, and conservation to hundreds of thousands of elementary students in Wisconsin and neighboring states. Book Trails was one of the most popular WSA programs, featuring storytelling drawn from 28 featured books selected by the radio teacher. Each spring, WSA mailed out the list of books to be used in Book Trails the following year. Milwaukee-born author, illustrator, and designer Ellen Raskin is perhaps best known for her 1979 Newbery

Medal-winning mystery novel The Westing Game. Ms. Raskin attended the University of Wisconsin– Madison and donated The Westing Game manuscript and other materials to the Cooperative Children's Book Center for students to study. This display case was custom built by the Friends of the CCBC in 1979 to house and display Ms. Raskin's manuscript and other materials. Over the years, the display case has featured numerous books, topics, and events related to CCBC activities. In 2023, the display case became home to a permanent display about Ellen Raskin's career, connection to the CCBC, and of course, The Westing Game. The display was designed by fellow Wisconsin author and illustrator Kevin Henkes, CCBC student reference assistant Molly Jensen, and CCBC director Tessa Michaelson Schmidt.

This Choices banner was based on Lois Ehlert's CCBC banner. The



font and layout were matched by CCBC reference assistant Molly Jensen. Using white felt, Bente Michaelson, mother of CCBC director Tessa Michaelson Schmidt, hand-sewed the letters on a remnant of the fabric used by Lois Ehlert in 1983 for the CCBC banner. The CCBC librarians commissioned the Choices banner to celebrate the new Choices display and reading area.

"Coming to Life: Biography for Children" was co-sponsored by the CCBC in 1978. The program art featured an illustration by Hal Siegel from the book jacket art for The Wind Eye by Robert Westall. This block was originally framed by the Friends of the CCBC in memory of charter member Muriel L. Fuller.

"The Fine Art of Book Illustration" was co-sponsored by the CCBC in 1979. The program art featured an illustration by Nancy Ekholm Burkert from The Scroobius Pip by Edward Lear and Ogden Nash.

Milwaukee-born author, illustrator, and designer Ellen Raskin is perhaps best-known for her 1979 Newbery Medal-winning mystery novel, The Westing Game. Ms. Raskin wrote and illustrated several picture books, including Twenty-two, Twenty-three. In this story, all the animals have advice for mouse on what to wear and what not to wear for the special holiday greeting on Twenty-two, Twenty-three. Raskin's early career in commercial art preparation influenced her design and ownership of all aspects of her artwork. The pieces displayed here feature Ms. Raskin's creativity, style, technique, and humor. Ms. Raskin attended the University of Wisconsin–Madison and donated The Westing Game manuscript and other materials to the Cooperative Children's Book Center for students to study.

Children's Book Week began in 1919 and is the longest running national literacy initiative in the country. Children's Book Week is administered by the literacy organization Every Child A Reader.

When little Evie woke up wearing her moon-and-stars PJs, she knew she wanted to do something new. She found a new hat on a hook, and her grandpa made her a small kite to fly. Evie's mother ran out to watch her, and her grandma had some supper ready after she came in from the adventure. Her sister wrapped Evie's blanket around her. Her father sang a song about his little Evie, her kite, and her day. Lucky Evie. She had everything any child needs: a home, clothing, and food, and family members to give her



loving attention. Joyous expressionistic images in an emotionally rich circular story explicitly inviting readers to go back to the beginning. Lucky Song was the winner of the first Charlotte Zolotow Award in 1998. This award is given annually to the author of the best picture book text published in the United States in the preceding year by the Cooperative Children's Book Center.
